Public charter schools and authorizers value student growth and achievement most of all, just like Michigan families do.

We work hard to authorize schools that have the capacity to prepare students with the skills they need to succeed in a global economy.

- » Students in public charter schools are gaining faster and performing better than their traditional school district peers. This outcome is even more pronounced in Detroit.
- » Public charter schools are tuition free and open to every student. They are addressing the educational needs of communities across the state of Michigan.



Opportunity for all

- » More than 76 percent of students in Michigan public charter schools are eligible for free and reduced-price lunch, compared to a statewide average of 50 percent.
- » Around 67 percent of public charter students belong to racial or ethnic minorities, compared to a statewide average of just 35 percent.
- » Public charter schools serve students with disabilities and English language learners. <u>No student is turned away.</u> Not one.

Getting bureaucracy out of the way to put students first.

- » Public charter schools receive less funding per pupil than their traditional school counterparts —and they have to pay for their own facilities out of the operating dollars they do receive.
- » By cutting through the bureaucracy, public charter schools are able to achieve better student outcomes.



MORE THAN 10 PERCENT OF ALL MICHIGAN STUDENTS ARE ENROLLED IN A PUBLIC CHARTER SCHOOL.

Approximately 149,000 students attend one of the 295 public charter schools operating statewide. Of these schools, 87 percent (259 schools) are authorized by MCCSA members.

Public charter schools deliver for kids. Michigan public charter schools have been honored among the state's most elite achievers using an array of state and national data. Michigan public charter school students often outperform their socioeconomic and demographic peers.



Authorizer leadership fosters school and student success.

MCCSA members have developed robust systems for overseeing and supporting public charter schools, including computer-adaptive testing models, automated compliance tools, and training programs for board members and administrators.

Public charter school boards face more accountability than their traditional school counterparts because the authorizer is ever-present, asking questions and holding schools accountable for student performance.

Michigan's public charter schools undergo a rigorous application and review process designed to ensure a strong academic and legal framework.

Authorizers scrutinize all aspects of a school team's proposed management and operational structure, contractual provisions, and program offerings to ensure compliance and freedom from conflicts of interest.
